
Dear colleagues,

It is my honor to welcome you to the 2015 Yuba College Convocation. This year's convocation is a kick start for what I anticipate to be a unifying and productive year. Following the theme of this year's convocation, we will learn <u>and</u> grow together.

After a challenging economic and organizational period at Yuba College, we are prepared to strengthen our programs with the support of our faculty and the ranks of our classified professionals and administrators. I am pleased to report that we are joined this fall by seven new faculty members, in the disciplines of Engineering, Manufacturing, Physics, Mathematics, Theater Arts and Counseling Services. Additionally, 14 of classified professional staff have joined Yuba College in both Student Services and Academic Services. In addition, all but three of our management team have been confirmed in permanent capacities. Yuba College is positioned to respond to the academic, training and cultural needs of our community. As we welcome new and returning team members, we want to share the reporting structure implemented for the 2015-16 academic year (See chart below).

Based on the outstanding work of the Yuba College faculty, staff and administrators, our accreditation was reaffirmed by AC-CJC in February 2015. In order to accomplish the same results for our Radiologic technology program, we are updating the facilities, one additional faculty member for the program will be hired and plans are in progress to expand the program into digital modalities. Additionally, Yuba College's Fire Academy and Public Safety programs have responded to the accreditation agencies requirements and are slated for reaffirmation of program certifications this fall. Yuba College has scheduled a Fire Academy and a Public Safety POST Level I module for spring semester 2016. These new offerings are in large part due to the positive feedback from the respective certifying agencies.

I anticipate an academic year in which we will strengthen our existing programs through the expansion of courses and training modules in order to better serve our students and the Yuba College communities.

Library: The library offers a wide variety of information services and resources to support teaching and learning across curriculum. With access to updated book and electronic book collections, periodical subscriptions, and online research databases, the library is a great place to study or to complete any research project. Customized workshops and private research appointments are available to faculty and students.

TLC: The Teaching and Learning Center is a centralized location for all professional development on the Yuba College Campus. The goal is provide a designated space for education and enrichment activities for faculty and staff. The TLC will work with IT to record sessions and have them archived on the web. This will allow all members to have access to the content, even if they cannot attend the session. The TLC is also working with various committees on campus to create training videos to the programs used every day such as Colleague, CurricuNet, and TracDat. The intent is to provide the necessary support to make these systems as user friendly as possible to keep Yuba College continuing on our path of growth and accountability started during the accreditation process. Everyone needs a little TLC.

CSC: The College Success Center, located in the Learning Resource Center at Yuba College, has a long history of providing effective and high-quality academic support to all Yuba College students. Among the topics to be discussed include: 1) the wide range of services available to your students, 2) integrating Center services with your course or curriculum, 3) the philosophy and structure of the program, 4) the students' success rates, and 5) the process to provide academic support for your students.

WLDC: You *know* that many of your students are not writing at college level. Underprepared students often put off or stall out on the developmental writing sequence but enroll in GE and transfer-level courses anyway. Having students in your classes who can't write (or read for that matter) at college level presents unique challenges for instructors. The Writing and Language Development Center exists to help students become more proficient writers, readers, and researchers. The WLDC supports language arts courses at every level, from ESL to advanced composition and literature courses, but what some don't know is that we work with all kinds of writing and reading across modes and disciplines: philosophy and history papers, college application essays, financial aid appeals, you name it. By attending this session you will get a window into what goes on here. See session notes generated by tutors to document the kind of work done with *your* students. We'll demonstrate how students use our Kurzweil text-to-speech software to extend their reading range and proofread their own papers, and let you take a look at some of our tutor training materials.
