Author, A. A. (Year of publication). *Title of book: Capital letter also for subtitle*. Publisher. DOI or URL if available.

Example, single author:

Stoneman, R. (2008). *Alexander the Great: A life in legend*. Yale University Press.

Example, more than one author:

Eggins, S., & Slade, D. (1997). Analyzing casual conversation. Cassell.

Example, no or unknown author:

Merriam-Webster's collegiate dictionary (11th ed.). (2003). Merriam-Webster.

Books and eBooks

Example, edited book (with no authors and with authors):

Leitch, M. G., & Rushton, C. J. (Eds.). (2019). A new companion to Malory. D. S. Brewer.

Malory, T. (2017). *Le morte darthur* (P. J. C. Field, Ed.). D. S. Brewer. (Original work published 1469-70)

Example, eBook (Identifying the format, platform, or device (e.g., ebook, Kindle book, etc.) of an authored ebook is no longer needed and should be treated as an authored print book.):

Green, C. (2019). *Incivility among nursing professionals in clinical and academic environments: Emerging research and opportunities.* IGI Global. https://doi.org/10.4018/978-1-5225-7341-8

Example, chapter from a book or eBook:

Armstrong, D. (2019). Malory and character. In M. G. Leitch, & C. J. Rushton (Eds.), *A new companion to Malory* (pp. 144-163). D. S. Brewer.

Print and Electronic Journal Article

Include DOI if given; otherwise, find URL for the journal's homepage

Remember: You can use the database citation tools to get the basic APA format... but be sure to check it for errors. Author(s), A. A. (Year of Publication). Title of article. *Title of Journal, volume number* (issue number), pages if known. DOI if available, or URL for journal's homepage

Example, print journal article:

Scruton, R. (1996). The eclipse of listening. *The New Criterion*, 15(3), 5–13.

Example, with DOI (digital object identifier):

Kennedy, A. K., Winter, V. R., & Corbin, M. M. (2019). Physical education class and body image perception: Are they related? *Physical Educator*, *76*(2), 467-484. https://doi.org/10.18666/tpe-2019-v76-i2-8766

Example, with journal homepage URL:

Purnell, M., Walsh, S., & Milone, M. (2004). Oncology nursing education:

Example:

Peterzell, J. (1990, April). Better late than never. *Time*, 135(17), 20–21.

Article from a Newspaper

Author, A. A. (Year of Publication, Month Day). Title of article. *Title of Newspaper*, page range. DOI or URL if accessed online

Example:

Schultz, S. (2005, December). Calls made to strengthen state energy policies. *The Country Today*, 1A, 2A.

Webpage

Author, A.A. (Year, Month Date). Title of Page. Site Name. URL

*if the author and site name are the same, omit the site name from the citation *Example, with author:*

Price, D. (2018, March 23). *Laziness does not exist*. Medium. https://humanparts.medium.com/laziness-does-not-exist-3af27e312d01

*it's no longer necessary to include "Retrieved from" before a DOI or URL Example, group name:

Centers for Disease Control and Prevention. (2018, August 22). *Preventing HPV-associated cancers*. https://www.cdc.gov/cancer/hpv/basic_info/prevention.htm/

Example, no author:

Quantum mechanics. (2019, November 19), Wikipedia. Retrieved November 25, 2019 from https://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/Quantum_mechanics

Example, tweet and Twitter profile:

Canada [@Canada]. (2019, October 31). Happy #Halloween [Tweet].
Twitter. https://twitter.com/Canada/status/1189910506536079360

MLA Style [@mlastyle]. (n.d.). *Tweets* [Twitter profile]. Retrieved January 12, 2020, from https://twitter.com/mlastyle
